I am writing in order to ask that you grant Prosecutorial Discretion to Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago.

My name is Leah Erlbaum and I rent an apartment at 33 Russell St. in Burlington, VT. I am a substitute teacher, gardener, and I also work with adults with developmental disabilities. I am a United States citizen and Vermont resident. I grew up in East Montpelier, VT, graduated from College of the Atlantic in 2008 with a B.A. in Human Ecology, and returned to Vermont in 2011. I am an active member of my greater Vermont community: I care for ageing neighbors and friends, I sing and dance in local groups, and I have a community garden plot. I volunteer in basic English classes with Vermont Adult Learning, and I also frequently volunteer with the Vermont Worker's Center and Migrant Justice to help with hotline calls and event planning.

I met Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago in the summer of 2011, and we have become friends since I moved to Burlington in October of 2011. I have spent time with Danilo both in informal social situations and in situations where he held a leadership role, such as leading workshops and speaking tours. Because I speak Spanish, Danilo and I have had the fortune to be able to communicate with ease, and I occasionally serve as an informal translator in Danilo's company.

I know Danilo as a thoughtful, generous, person who is a loyal friend and is a dedicated and articulate spokesman for racial equality and justice. Danilo is a familiar face to many Burlington residents, and he has become an integral part of our local community.

Danilo is eager to learn new things and is self-assured when approaching even the most substantial of projects. When I met Danilo, he was just learning about movie editing. He has since dedicated himself to improving his audio and video editing skills, and frequently is the go-to person for media expertise in his volunteer capacity at Migrant Justice. I am inspired by his willingness to learn from those around him – and by his boldness in immediately applying his learning to very public projects without a trace of the self-consciousness I might display in a similar role.

As a leader, Danilo is articulate and confident. I was present at the December 10th 2011 Human Rights Day Conference in Burlington, VT, where Danilo spoke as part of a panel and received an award for his human rights work. He also organized a workshop along with fellow organizers and volunteers from Migrant Justice to educate others about Vermont's dairy industry and the root causes of migration. Workshop participants listened carefully when he spoke; he chooses his words with care, and speaks his mind frankly yet respectfully in a large group.

Danilo's outspoken support for human rights and anti-discrimination policies has moved many Vermonters to re-examine their own views on immigration and race, begin to embrace Vermont's diverse communities. Through dialogue and speeches to the Vermont legislature, college students, conference attendees, and even Vermont's governor, Danilo has become a recognizable face and spokesperson for an isolated and invisible group in our state. Danilo assumes this role with grace and confidence.

For these reasons, Danilo is a positive role model within the farm worker community, as well as in the larger Vermont community. I am personally inspired by Danilo's courage, as I know he inspires many of my Vermont neighbors and friends as well.

In conclusion, as my grandmother might say in Yiddish, Danilo is a "mensch": a person of integrity and dignity, with admirable values and a strong sense of right and wrong. He is a valuable asset to our community, an inspiration to many, and a good friend. I strongly urge you to grant Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago should be granted prosecutorial discretion.



I am writing in order to ask that you grant prosecutorial discretion to Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago. My name is William (Billy) Peard. I am a current resident of South Royalton, Vermont and a full time student at Vermont Law School. I am a U.S. citizen and a friend of Mr. Lopez.

I have known Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago for about one year. I first met Mr. Lopez because he and I were both volunteers for a small organization based in Vermont called Migrant Justice. In the subsequent months, I talked with Mr. Lopez at several other events related to the work of Migrant Justice. I have seen him speak publicly at several events about his volunteer work to improve the living conditions of Mexican citizens who are living and working on Vermont farms. On a couple occasions, I have also participated in volunteer meetings with Mr. Lopez. In those meetings, Mr. Lopez took on leadership roles. In both contexts, I found Mr. Lopez to be candid and honest. Mr. Lopez is passionate about his volunteer work in Vermont, and he approaches his work with humility and a soft-spoken demeanor. He is not boastful, arrogant, or domineering. Even in stressful situations, I can always expect to see Mr. Lopez wearing a calm smile and to share an encouraging word with his colleagues. I have observed him in many social settings and have discovered that he is universally well-liked among his Mexican compatriots and among his American colleagues.

On one occasion, several months ago, I sat down with Mr. Lopez for dinner and got to know him quite well. He and I talked about his former life in Mexico and about how he ended up in Vermont. He is a natural storyteller and has a good sense of humor. I was surprised to learn, after several conversations with Mr. Lopez in Spanish, that in fact he is conversant in English. We would sometimes switch between the two languages during our conversation. When I asked him how he learned English, I was impressed to learn that he had simply picked it up without any formal training in the United States and with only the most basic classroom training during his primary schooling in Mexico.

I have no doubt that Mr. Lopez is and will continue to be a productive member of his community in Vermont. I feel grateful to have had the opportunity to know Mr. Lopez during this past year, and I strongly urge ICE to exercise its prosecutorial discretion in the case of Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago.

Dear Madam or Sir:

I write to ask you to give serious, and all due consideration possible, to exercising your prosecutorial discretion with the result being that Mr. Lopez not face removal proceedings. I write in my personal capacity but my knowledge of Mr. Lopez stems solely from my professional role as the executive director and legal counsel for the Vermont Human Rights Commission.

I have been a Vermont resident for over 40 years. I have been admitted to the Vermont bar for 28 years, having served for more than ten years in my present position. Prior to working here at the Commission, I served as Vermont's defender general (chief public defender) for 8.5 years having previously worked in both civil rights enforcement and public defense as both an attorney and an investigator.

I became professionally involved with the issue of undocumented foreign nationals working on dairy farms in Vermont as one of the Commission's enforcement priorities is to combat racial bias in the criminal justice system. I was receiving frequent reports of state and local police detaining dark-skinned individuals solely based on either the officer's or a community member's suspicion that the person was in Vermont without lawful status, and not for violation of any state law or local ordinance.

I met Mr. Lopez about 18 months ago through the organization now known as Migrant Justice. I observed Mr. Lopez providing extraordinary leadership to members of his community. This included seeing him speak rationally and calmly to community groups and the public-at-large about the vulnerabilities that workers in Vermont face when lacking legal status. He was part of a contingent ability for foreign nationals to obtain state-issued identification cards so that law enforcement can be secure in accepting the identities offered by these foreign nationals when they interface with police officers.

In each and every such observation, Mr. Lopez performed admirably receiving the praise and support of those to whom he addressed his comments. He is highly articulate and does not spout inflammatory rhetoric. Rather, he clearly lays out the need for fundamental reform of our immigration system to provide a work permit option for year-round farmers such as milk producers. This reform is necessary to avoid making law breakers out of not only the foreign nationals but also Vermont farmers.

In my opinion, Mr. Lopez is a very gentle and kind soul who presents no risk to public safety. His orientation is to serving not only the migrant and farming community, but the entire Vermont community. I am writing to you on behalf of Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago (Danilo Lopez). I believe that the work Danilo is doing for the organization called "Migrant Justice" is extremely important to the Hispanic farm worker community and to the many Vermont farmers who employ Hispanic migrant workers, and helps improve our democracy. I respectfully ask that you exercise leniency and decide not to deport Danilo.

My name is Daniel B. Cohen. 1 am 66 years old, and I have been an educator most of my life. I have taught at Vermont Community College, Lyndon State College, and at the North American Hockey Academy and Mt. Mansfield Ski Academy in Stowe, Vermont. I was the Director of the Greensboro Free Library in my home town of Greensboro for 12 years, and founded and directed the library at the Bishop John A. Marshall School in Morrisville, Vermont (a K-8 Catholic School). For the last 5 years I have been employed as a tutor by the Vermont Department of Education's Migrant Education Program, working with the Hispanic farm worker population in Northeastern Vermont. I currently visit about 20 dairy farms on a weekly basis, visiting about 65-70 Hispanic farm workers. I teach English, translate for farmers and farm workers, help workers access medical, dental, and other social services, obtain appropriate clothing, and fulfill other basic needs.

On April 5, I accompanied Danilo when he and a colleague from Migrant Justice visited some farms in my area, and later addressed faculty, students, and farm workers at Sterling College in Craftsbury, Vermont. I am old enough to remember Cesar Chavez, the heroic organizer of Mexican farm workers a few decades ago. Danilo closely resembles Cesar Chavez. He teaches people; he inspires people; he makes them aware of their own worth and dignity; and he does this without a trace of anger or negativity. Miraculously, people who have previously been passive and silent become more hopeful and find that they have a voice and the courage to speak on their own behalf.

Tomorrow I am travelling to the statehouse in Montpelier, Vermont to attempt to meet with legislators from this region. Five Hispanic farm workers are going with me to participate in this basic exercise in democracy. We will be promoting S-238, a bill which would allow Hispanic migrant farm workers to obtain drivers' licenses. The bill has already passed the Vermont Senate and is supported by the Governor. I am sure that the farm workers accompanying me to dialogue with and inform the legislators who affect their lives would never have even imagined that they could speak to people in power without having listened to Danilo. The peaceful participation of isolated and marginalized people in our democracy can only strengthen this country. Danilo is working and teaching in the tradition of Cesar Chavez and Martin Luther King, Jr., and he should be allowed to stay in this country.

I am writing in order to ask that you grant Prosecutorial Discretion to Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago. My name is Brendan O'Neill and I am US citizen, educator and founder of an organization called Migrant Justice in Vermont.

I first met "Danilo" in the fall of 2009 when I was an English as a Second Language Teacher with the Vermont Migrant Education Program. Danilo was always punctual, prepared, and engaged. He went out of his way to make other students in the class feel comfortable and relaxed. He was respectful, articulate, and thoughtful.

On December 22cnd, 2009 after months of working closely with Danilo our English class was interrupted with heart breaking news. One of Danilo's fellow students, Samuel, received a phone call that his cousin, José Obeth Santis Cruz, was killed in a Vermont farming accident. Though Danilo did not know José personally he sprung into immediate action showing both compassion and strong leadership. He helped organize a collection amongst the migrant community in order to help return the young worker's body home to his family in Chiapas, Mexico. This death and community response in Vermont by leaders such as Danilo inspired a community building project that led to a new organization now called Migrant Justice. I am proud to say that I have known Danilo for nearly three years and each year I've only grown more impressed with him as a friend and human being.

In August 2011 Danilo helped lead a farm worker delegation to meet with Vermont Governor Shumlin to express concern about federal immigration policies that were blurring lines between police and immigration agents and causing widespread fear for Vermont's communities of color to access local and state police when they were victims or witnesses of crime. Ironically, just weeks later Danilo was traveling as a passenger in a vehicle on Interstate 89 in Vermont that was pulled over by State Police for speeding. Upon seeing the brown skinned individuals the Trooper shifted his attention from the traffic violation to a series of inappropriate questions of the passengers including asking them about their immigration status. The Trooper was in clear violation of the State Police's own Bias-Free-Policing Policy and Danilo was fully aware of this and notified Migrant Justice.

Migrant Justice responded with a community support campaign reaching out to VT Governor Shumlin calling for an investigation. Weeks later Danilo helped lead a farm worker delegation to meet with the Governor and call for a strengthened and clarified policy leading the Governor and State Police to create a new and improved policy that will benefit all communities of color in Vermont. Then, the VT Human Rights Commission ruled that Danilo was in fact discriminated against. Soon after, Danilo was recognized in a huge conference at the University of Vermont as the 2011 VT Human Rights Hero.

Danilo has a way of bringing out the best in all those who have the privilege to get to know him. Vermont is a better place thanks to Danilo. I urge you to please grant Prosecutorial Discretion to Daniel "Danilo" Alejandro Lopez.

I am writing concerning Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago. I am a resident of Charlotte, Vermont, and a middle school social studies teacher. Currently I am staying at home to care for my two young daughters. I am the Secretary of the Vermont Alliance for the Social Studies and a Deacon of the Charlotte Congregational Church.

I first met Danilo at a Spanish church service held at the Charlotte Congregational Church in January 2011. Since that time, as a fellow resident of Charlotte, I have had occasion to provide him with transportation. I have been in attendance at several meetings of the advocacy organization Migrant Justice where Danilo has played a leadership role.

When I first drove Danilo to a Migrant Justice meeting I was immediately put at ease, despite my lack of Spanish fluency, by his gentle personality and ease of humor. Not to mention his good command of English. At the meeting Danilo spoke, somewhat hesitantly, to a group of thirty volunteers about his work in establishing better communication between farm workers. This work would enable workers to help each other with issues arising in their isolated lives, including gaining access to basic services and handling workplace abuses.

The next time I heard Danilo speak was at a meeting some months later, and this time he was speaking to other farm workers. For many migrant farm workers, these once–a-month meetings are the one opportunity they have to leave their farms and socialize with others. They are also an opportunity to discuss any difficulties they may be having and potential solutions. At this meeting, Danilo was speaking from a place of more confidence and strong leadership. His attitude of hope and belief in positive change, as a farm worker himself, was clearly something his fellow farm workers needed to hear.

Danilo's presence in Vermont has changed the nature of the discussion around the issues facing migrant farm workers in our state. His willingness to testify before the Vermont Legislature and to speak to the press has given Vermonters an insight into the hidden world which is helping to sustain Vermont's dairy industry.

The last time I gave Danilo a ride was from a bus stop in Charlotte to his home, only three miles away. At the end of the ride he asked how much money he should pay me. I declined

any compensation, and this is a fine example of who Danilo is. He is not looking for the easy, free way. He is looking to contribute. He is looking to continue his work so that the human rights of all people living in Vermont are recognized – important work that needs to be done.

I respectfully request that you grant Prosecutorial Discretion to Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago.

My name is Martha Caswell, I live at 125 North Champlain Street in Burlington, Vermont with my husband, Seth Wolcott-MacCausland and son Jasper Caswell-MacCausland. Danilo is generous in sharing his story so that others better understand the situation of farm workers living in Vermont. Ours is a state that relies on these workers to maintain our dairy industry. They are a population, albeit hidden, that is critical to the health and maintenance of Vermont's economy. Undocumented workers are already at times exploited and often live hidden away from the rest of the state. They are often subjected to racial profiling because they are "different" in a majority white, rural state. Even Governor Shumlin said that our policy has been to "look the other way." Unfortunately this neither serves the individuals who are caught in the middle of this situation nor furthers the goal of

resolving this need with an appropriate policy shift that would provide legal status for the workers who are currently undocumented. By going out into communities and talking about his experience, Danilo is furthering a dialogue that is badly needed and long overdue.

Because of the hours we have spent together in the past months, Danilo has become "uncle Danilo" to my son Jasper. The tenderness and care he shows to Jasper is incredible. It is this side of Danilo – the yin to the yang of his passion for speaking out and pursuing justice - that softens him. This is the quiet side, when he isn't responsible for representing a whole population of people - for speaking as the voice of farm workers in Vermont - when he can smile, relax, and just be Danilo.

Danilo is contributing to our community in tangible and profound ways. Through his leadership within the community of migrant workers in Vermont, Danilo is building bridges among workers, farmers, service providers, law enforcement, state officials and allies - engendering a sense of hope and dedication toward addressing this complicated situation.

With my whole heart and no hesitation I believe that Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago should be granted prosecutorial discretion.

My name is Michele Jenness. I am the executive director of Vermont Immigration and Asylum Advocates (VIAA) which is located at 241 N. Winooski Ave., Burlington, Vermont. VIAA is one of the only organizations in Vermont that is focused on meeting the legal needs of indigent asylum seekers, torture survivors and immigrants.

I learned about Mr. Lopez's arrest on the day that it occurred, September 13, 2011. The initial stop was made by Vermont State Police for a traffic violation and the two passengers, Mr. Lopez and Mr. Jose Antonio Meza Sandoval were then questioned by the State Police as to their immigration status. When local and state law enforcement ask those who look like immigrants about their immigration status, it raises serious civil rights concerns. It can lead to racial profiling and divisive community policing practices.

Since last September, I have been fortunate to attend many forums where Mr. Lopez was a presenter. The Second Vermont Latino Agricultural Labor Roundtable, 'Mexico/U.S. Border Dynamic', a mobile Mexican consulate held in Middlebury, Vermont are some of the forums where Mr. Lopez spoke eloquently about the plight of the migrant laborers in Vermont and the legal reforms needed to improve their lives. Mr. Lopez is also an accomplished videographer and his short films which deal with civil rights are a wonderful tool to engage more people in these issues.

It is my firm belief that Mr. Lopez is an invaluable asset to this community; that he raises the level of public discourse on issues of human rights and racial justice and that he works hard to find legal avenues which would improve the lives of immigrants in the U.S.

Dear Chief Counsel Officer:

My name is Philip Baruth, and I'm a Vermont State Senator representing Chittenden County, as well as a Professor of English at the University of Vermont in Burlington. It is my understanding that Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago has applied to you for prosecutorial discretion in his pending immigration case. This letter is sent on his behalf, and by way of summary let me say that over the last six months I have come to think of Danilo as one of the most honorable and admirable young men I know. It is my hope that you will permit him to stay in the United States for as long as that is his wish.

Far from being a threat of any sort to our greater community here in Vermont, Danilo has selflessly dedicated himself to mitigating the sometimes harsh conditions experienced by his countrymen while working on dairy farms here in the US, and that effort deserves our thanks and recognition. Let me explain more specifically.

Some five months ago, Danilo and others from the organization Migrant Justice approached the Senate Agriculture Committee, upon which I currently sit, to discuss a bill then being drafted – S.238, which would address the working conditions for dairy workers from Mexico and Guatemala, many of whom labor on isolated Vermont farms, often without access to proper medical care and the necessities of daily life. And so over the course of several months, we took testimony from Danilo and others, and worked closely with them to craft a bill that would pass Federal muster, assuage the fears of a sometimes skeptical public, yet also substantially improve the lives of young men and women who typically work 10-12 hour days.

During those months, I watched Danilo very closely, and found him to be impressively intelligent, self-effacing, and extremely hard-working. He has become a one-man liaison between his countrymen and the growing number of Vermonters who would like to make their working conditions more humane; in his handling of this role, he has shown both maturity and an enviable evenness of temper. I know I speak for the other Senators on Senate Agriculture when I say the following: Danilo is a very special individual, a gifted young man who – because of chance and circumstance – has become a natural leader for many others. I ask you to exercise your prosecutorial discretion in this case because Danilo has deserved that discretion through his personal conduct, but also because solving our intractable immigration problems will require skilled young leaders on both sides of the debate, and Danilo represents precisely that sort of judicious, sympathetic and level-headed leadership. We sorely need him here in Vermont, every bit as much as he needs your intervention to remain.

Thank you for your consideration. Please don't hesitate to contact me should you need any further information – Danilo's case is of very special concern to me, and if I can strengthen it in any way – including sponsoring him personally in his attempts to secure a place here in the US - I will do so wholeheartedly.

I am writing in support of Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago's application for Prosecutorial Discretion to permit him to remain in the United States. I am a US citizen living in Starksboro, Vermont. As an Assistant Professor of Community and International Development I have had a research focus on agricultural labor issues for the past seven years. One of the key issues for Vermont's dairy industry has been learning about the issues and perspectives of our new Mexican labor force. There have been few Mexican farmworkers willing and able to articulate the viewpoint of this workforce, and Daniel Lopez has been among those advancing the dialogue and helping bridge communications between Latino workers, dairy farmers and policy makers.

Over the past year I have had the opportunity to meet Daniel Lopez a number of times and know him through his public work on agricultural labor issues in Vermont. He participated at a statewide meeting we organized at the University of Vermont this past February on the changing dairy labor force in Vermont, and I have heard him testify to Vermont legislators at our Statehouse. I left my job at Enterprise Rent-a-Car last autumn to devote more time to my studies, but may return to work with Enterprise in May.

In 2011 I co-founded a student organization at Saint Michael's college in collaboration with the University of Vermont. The organization is called Juntos (Spanish for "together"), and initially began at Middlebury College. We work to teach English to migrant workers in Vermont. We work in collaboration with the organizations Migrant Justice and Migrant Education. We provide transportation for these migrant workers (to the grocery store, community meals, church, etc.) and work to educate the community about the realities of migrant labor. I have been coordinating Juntos since its inception in Summer 2011. I met Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago through my involvement with Juntos and Migrant Justice, for whom I am currently an intern. about the problems of immigration policy, law, and reform both federally and locally. I remember learning much and being taken aback by how knowledgeable and informed he was. Throughout last autumn I interacted and worked with him on a weekly or biweekly basis. This increased when he began working full time at Migrant Justice. Danilo proved an invaluable resource for my senior thesis, and some of his interview provided one of my strongest thesis arguments. I would now consider Danilo a hard-working colleague, valuable resource, and a good and loyal friend.

Danilo has become an integral part of the community here in Vermont. He has a phenomenal work ethic, and is very generous with his help and time. I have never heard of someone asking him for either help or time and having him refuse – no matter when or how long of a commitment it may be. In this way, Danilo has completely invested himself in a variety of causes. It is for this reason that his remaining in Vermont is so important – Danilo is the driving factor behind so many great things in the community.

For example, he is leading Migrant Justice in their fight for the state bill S-238 in the state house. He gives regular presentations at schools, libraries, rallies, and other events. He creates, mixes, and edits inspiring and informative videos. He volunteers his time selflessly. He is an adamant advocate and defender human rights for all.

On top of all of this, Danilo has been learning English and studying to achieve his GED. After one testimony to the Senate Agricultural Committee in the Vermont State House in Montpelier, one senator told Danilo that he was beyond impressed with him. He was stunned when he learned that Danilo had never attended college, and was so impressed with his intelligence and drive that he urged him to return to education at some point regardless of the cost because of his incredible potential.

Fortunately for the community in Vermont (and perhaps unfortunately for Danilo), his return to education must wait a little longer. He is too deeply invested and embedded in what is going on here in Vermont to leave yet. The hole left by his departure would be too big to fill.

Due to the aforementioned, I would like to clearly state for the ICE attorney, that I believe that Mr. Lopez should be granted prosecutorial discretion in this case. It is a shame that racial profiling led to his detention in the first place. It would be a bigger shame if his deportation occurred at a time when his presence and hard work was still needed in Vermont.

To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing in support of Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago's request for Prosecutorial Discretion.

I had the privilege of representing Danilo before the Vermont Human Rights Commission on the question of whether his September 19, 2011 detention violated the Vermont Public Accommodations Act. Having reviewed the video of the traffic stop, it is clear to me that the only reason Trooper Hatch extensively questioned and ultimately detained Danilo was because of the color of his skin. In my opinion, this violated the United States Constitution and the Vermont statute. See, e.g., Farm Labor Organizing Comm'n v. Ohio State Hwy Patrol, 308 F.3d 523, 532-33 (6th Cir. 2002)(equal protection violation if targeted for questioning based solely on Hispanic appearance). The Human Rights Commission agreed, finding probable cause that Danilo's stop and detention were illegal.

Beyond the success with the Human Rights Commission, what I wanted to highlight was my personal interaction with Danilo. He was a very thoughtful and polite client. He was impressive in explaining in forceful yet respectful language the indignities of the illegal stop to everyone at the hearing, including to members of the State Police and the Attorney General's office. I can confirm that to Danilo, his pursuit of justice had little to do with himself, but rather how he could help improve things for others who are similarly situated. Thankfully, in large part due to Danilo's efforts, the State of Vermont has started the process of adopting better guidelines on how to deal with immigration issues in future traffic stops.

I am writing in order to ask that you grant Prosecutorial Discretion to Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago.

I am the chairman of the Peace, Justice and Integrity of Creation Committee of the Vermont Ecumenical Council and Bible Society (VEC), consisting of a majority of the major Christian denominations in Vermont. We have just completed an extensive review of the status of migrant farm workers in Vermont, both documented and undocumented, in preparation of a statement which will be promulgated throughout the state. I am writing as an individual and not as a member of VEC or the committee.

As part of our review we interviewed many people to learn more about the reasons why people leave their homes to migrate to Vermont and work on our farms and orchards, their status and living conditions and the response of Vermont law enforcement to their presence in the state.

The people we interviewed included the Consul General of Mexico Daniel Hernandez Joseph, Colonel Thomas J. L'Esperance, head of the Vermont State Police, Dr. Susannah McCandliss, Department of Geography, University of Vermont, an expert on migrant workers in Vermont, and Danilo Alejandro Lopez Santiago, accompanied by Brendan O'Neil, co-founder of Vermontbased Migrant Justice.

I and the other members of our committee were struck by the presentation made by Danilo Lopez. His story of the reasons why he and so many Mexican men and women leave their communities to seek work to support their families in Mexico was very compelling. Also Danilo's recounting of how these workers, so important to Vermont agriculture, must live in the shadows of our society riveted the sympathetic attention of the ministers, priest and deacons on the committee.

But the most impressive aspect of the committee's discussion with Danilo was the man himself. Danilo showed himself to be a man of deep integrity, honesty, modesty and ethics. He told his story without artifice, in a straight- forward manner. He did not blame anyone for his situation

and spoke sympathetically of those who have been less than kind to him and his fellow workers. He described with pride the family he had to leave behind. While displaying sadness at missing them, Danilo did not dwell on this nor try manipulate our feelings. He expressed deep appreciation for the work of Migrant Justice and the scores of Vermonters who have been advocates for just treatment of migrants in the state.

He described himself as not being a religious person but someone who respected religion. Saying this to a committee, the majority of whom are ordained clergy, indicated to us that he was not there to curry our favor or sympathy but to talk about real issues in a truthful way.

We were also impressed by his obvious intelligence and his understanding of the confused nature of U.S. immigration law. His soft spoken manner belies a deep passion for just treatment of people who keep our farms economically viable, help maintain the state's rural economy and yet live in fear of arrest and deportation.

I have had the opportunity to hear Danilo speak to state legislators at the Vermont State House. He remains respectful and open while providing the law makers with fact-based testimony. He does not plead for special treatment, only justice. The legislators are clearly impressed with him as was Vermont Governor Peter Shumlin when Danilo and others met with him.

Danilo is an asset to Vermont and the people who work with him. He asks nothing more than the opportunity to earn and send money to his family in Mexico so that they can build a better future. I would be proud to have him as my son.

Please grant Prosecutorial Discretion to Daniel Alejandro Lopez Santiago.

I would be happy to respond to any questions and would be willing to travel to Boston to do so.

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
